- 2: Includes an identification of a particular class of works to which the reply comment is responsive class 5, smartphones and tablets
- 3: Numbers each particular class of works being addressed in the reply comment Class number in square bracket []
- 4: Provides a summary of the argument for each class addressed I am for extending the exemption making alternate smartphone OS NOT illegal, and I feel this should be extended to tablets too
- 5: Provides particular factual support or legal argument for each class of works opposed or supported in the reply comment.
- [5] If I purchase a computer, whether it is a desktop, laptop, tablet, or pocket sized computer (phone) it only makes sense that I should be able to install and run any legal operating system available.
